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## Your MP Report

Winter Energy Bills
Supporting you with rising costs
Victoria Collins MP

As it gets colder, many families across Long Marston, Wilstone, Puttenham face the daunting prospect of soaring energy bills. Constituents are telling me about the immense pressure these costs place on household budgets, forcing difficult choices between heating and other essentials.

The reality is stark: energy costs show no signs of decreasing across the UK. Whilst the Government announced an expansion to the Warm Home Discount in June 2025, extending £150 rebates to 2.7 million additional households next winter, this barely scratches the surface of the crisis we face. The latest Department for Energy Security and Net Zero statistics estimated that 11% of households in England lived in fuel poverty in 2024, with projections suggesting this figure will climb even higher in 2025.

Though I welcome any attempt to relieve pressure on soaring household bills, the Warm Home Discount offers only a temporary lifeline, and leaves middle-income households that do not meet the requirements struggling. A one-off £150 payment cannot address the underlying problem of relentlessly rising energy bills that keep families awake at night worrying about staying warm.

That's why I recently challenged the Government directly, asking whether they will commit to providing a lasting solution to fuel poverty across the UK. We need an emergency 10-year home upgrade programme with

meaningful incentives for upgrading energy sources. Liberal Democrats have also called to halve the price of energy by breaking the link between the cost of electricity and the price of gas

I have repeatedly held the Government to account, both in the chamber and through tabled questions, asking what fiscal steps they are taking to support households in Harpenden & Berkhamsted with their energy bills. I've also highlighted how high energy costs put strain on rural businesses, threatening the backbone of our local economy I remain absolutely committed to fighting for affordable energy for every household in Long Marston, Wilstone, Puttenham. No one should face the impossible choice

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## **Allotment News**

Readers may recall that in September's edition, I made the mistake of grumbling publicly about the lack of rain. The well was wheezing, the ground was cracking, our patience was beginning to follow suit, and our spirits were beginning to wilt in sympathy. It seems the weather gods took my comments rather personally, because almost as soon as the newsletter went out, the heavens opened. If you have been caught in a downpour, I am afraid the fault may be mine.

Back then we were rationing water like wartime tea, a pitiful allowance drawn from the well at ungodly hours. The cauliflowers and cabbages sulked and shrank, the Charlotte and King Edward potatoes emerged rather on the small side, as the sweetcorn gazed skyward in despair.

Then came the deluge. The soil, giddy with excitement, drank deeply and immediately forgot its manners, converting the beds into something between a bog and a bath. The weeds, emboldened by this sudden generosity, staged a coup and have been running the place ever since. Things have since settled somewhat, and some beds have descended into cheerful anarchy, autumn raspberries and tomatoes multiplied as if the whole business were being judged by the Royal Horticultural Society. Beetroot and kohl rabi swelled with self-importance, and the indefatigable perpetual spinach and chard continue their magnificent march into autumn. With a flourish of end-of-season determination and enterprise, extra lettuce and spring onions were planted, and have gone on to grace more than a few luncheon plates. Their sense of civic duty is exemplary.

The slugs and snails, meanwhile, have returned from their underground sabbatical looking refreshed and, for now, better-behaved. Perhaps the drought encouraged introspection, or perhaps they have simply decided to return on more civilised terms. Either way, I shall not press the point.


Elsewhere the winter cabbages are strutting about with confidence, and the Brussels sprouts are lined up smartly for Christmas. As the beds clear we are

digging over, adding farmyard manure, and covering up for winter. The unmistakable scent of 'progress' now drifts cheerfully across the plots. The final task before the year's end is planting garlic and onions, which, unlike their gardener, seem positively to enjoy being cold and damp, regarding hardship, perversely, as character-building.

It has been a year of extremes, bone-dry one month, waterlogged the next, with every mood of weather in between. Yet somehow nature has balanced the books. The fruit harvest was glorious; apples, plums, pears, strawberries, blackcurrants, gooseberries, and redcurrants in heroic quantities. Jam and chutney production has reached record levels, and cupboard space now exists only in legend. Neighbours have begun to edge away politely when offered "just one more jar," and can be seen sprinting from front door to car in the mornings, lest I spring from behind a bush and deposit yet another cooking apple upon them before retreating, cackling triumphantly, into the shrubbery.

So we end the season muddy but content, smaller cabbages, livelier weeds, but plenty to smile about. Here is to next year, moderate rain, civilised slugs, and always something delicious left to spread on toast.

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
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# From the Vicarage Introducing "Forest Church"

#### Why Forest Church?

Lots of people say they feel closer to God or to a sense of the spiritual while spending time in nature. Forest Church engages with this and connection with the natural world is a core part of its gathering. It is not just indoor church moved outdoors!

#### What is Forest Church?

Forest Church is designed to be all age and everyone is warmly welcome. The sessions will last around 40 minutes, with additional time to share some food and drink.

In November we will be thinking about trees and so our snacks will be made from things that grow on trees!

Each session will include activities in the churchyard, some individual, some communal, and there is always the option to sit alone in the churchyard for some or all of the time and simply reflect if that is what is most helpful for you that day.

Celtic spirituality refers to nature as the 'big book': the gift of creation as an important way of connecting with and learning about God. Forest Church leans into this and celebrates physicality as an important part of spirituality being outdoors, exploring, touching, and interacting with the natural world. We will think about the cycle of the seasons, the plants, trees and creatures that we see, where our food comes from, and what all of this offers to us and prompts us to reflect on.

Connection is a good word to summarise what Forest Church is about - connection with body, mind and soul; connection between us and God; connection between us and nature; and connection with one another in community.

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# Update on Wilstone reservoir strengthening Works

The extraordinary piling work to strengthen the reservoir embankments has been completed. The huge cranes which lifted the 2000,two-ton, 11 metre steel piles into place, have now been removed.

The piles were silently pushed into the embankment using specialised vibrating equipment. In the photo shown, you can just see the very top of the piles on the embankment. These will be covered over when a new path around the reservoir is laid..

By the time you read this, the road next to Wilstone Reservoir car park will have partially re-opened with one lane closed and traffic lights in place while work continues. These restrictions are likely to be in place until ends of November 2025.

Wilstone Reservoir car park will remain closed while work continues to level and resurface the footpath that runs along the top of the reservoir embankment, and the steps leading to the footpath from the car park will also be replaced. The car park is scheduled to re-open by March 2026.

The collector drains at the toe of the reservoir embankment are also going to be upgraded. These drains monitor any signs that

the reservoir is leaking. And we'll be carrying out work underground to repair and re-line the 200-year culvert that is still used to draw off water from the reservoir in emergencies. This 300-metre-long brick lined structure runs from the northeast corner of the reservoir down and beneath Lower Icknield Way.

The whole project is currently on track to be completed by the end of March 2026.

## From our Reporter at the council meeting

#### The first TRPC meeting of autumn was held at Wilstone on October 1st.

#### Gimme, gimme, gimme!

Our S106 money back! Chair Cllr Fox has not yet had had his meeting with County Cllr Symington and Luke Gibbons (Highways) to ask for the Lendon Grove S106 money to be returned to the TRPC, but is still keen to do so. At this stage he doesn't know the value of it.

#### I'm a Borough councillor, get me out of here!

Dacorum Borough Cllr Caroline Smith-Wright (formerly of the TRPC) attended the meeting to give an update on Dacorum issues. She reported that the Astrope Lane roadworks were now complete, apart from the sign for Astrope, which could be affixed on the opposite side of the one for Puttenham.

#### **HGV Vehicles**

Cllr Smith-Wright reported that, at County level, there are major concerns about the impact of heavy goods vehicles (HGVs) on the villages, and that efforts are being made to protect the villages by getting the HGV satnav maps updated. It appears that it's possible to get roads shown as 'no through roads' or dead ends, so that the drivers won't even attempt to go down them. Cllr Fox added that the lvinghoe Freight Strategy has shown an increase in HGVs travelling through the area.

#### **Flooding**

Cllr Smith-Wright is also working on a local plan, nature recovery and flooding. The County Council are aware of the need for good flood defences for small developments. This is particularly pertinent in Tring Rural, as the appeal has been allowed for nine self-build homes in Wilstone.

#### Village Warden

Then we got onto the thorny topic of the phasing out of the grants for the Warden and Concurrent Services, currently provided by Dacorum. At September's meeting Cllr Fox had reported that TRPC currently receive £14k a year. Cllr Smith-Wright responded that at this stage the phasing out of the grant is only a **c**onsultation, with the decision to be taken in December.

The issue was hotly debated! Clerk Chloe Collins pointed out that the consultation period coincided with the peak holiday period in July and August, in spite of a request last year that this period be avoided. Cllr Fox stated that it also clashed with budget-setting time, causing difficulties in knowing how much would have to be raised through the precept. Cllr Smith-Wright highlighted the difficulty that Dacorum is facing, because they receive a lot less money from the government and have to make it go round all the parishes. Each parish also uses the money differently. Cllr Foster remarked that removing the grant would be taking power and funding away from local people: we would lose the power to get the dog poop bins emptied! The Clerk asked whether TRPC should remove **all** the bins and tell people to take their litter home?! After all, that's what the Canal and Riverside Trust have done!

Eventually things simmered down a bit, but you may be asking why the Warden's grant is such a big deal? I didn't know - and I suspect many of you, dear readers, don't know either - that the rubbish and dog poop bins that adorn the recreation grounds, and other areas in the parish, are actually emptied **by the Village Warden**, who is employed by the TRPC. Mr Reedman bags everything up and then along trundles a van from Dacorum to collect the bags. This

means that when the bins are reported to be full, your very own Parish Council asks the Warden to deal with them! So, no grant - no warden. And, I suspect, a lot more dog-poop and litter left laying about! If the decision to remove the grant is approved, the only way the TRPC can see of maintaining the service would be to increase the Parish precept part of the Council Tax. Not an easy decision.

#### Parks and recreation

Cllr Fox reported that Long Marston Cricket Club have applied for a grant to improve their changing facilities. The club wants to host more matches and will need more pitches. It was agreed that, as the club is an asset to the community, the TRPC should offer something. However, the size of the grant requested was far more than could be met, and there is no budget left for grants in this financial year. There followed a discussion about other potential sources of funding, with Cllr Smith-Wright advising that County Cllr Symington has a 'locality budget' and Dacorum has a 'leisure budget', which might be able to help. It was agreed that TRPC would offer a grant of £500 in the next financial year.

Cllr Foster gave an update on phase 2 of the Home Ground Cafe project, and thanked Cllr Smith-Wright for the grant. The purchase of the trees is being organised, as they need to be planted this autumn, and the raised beds are being costed. Cycle racks are being purchased as part of the 'green grant', and it needs to be decided where they are best positioned. The hedge alongside the access to the car park is also going to be trimmed back, to allow more room for pedestrians and vehicles.

Cllr Macdonald has sent a lengthy email to David Uncle (Senior Flood Risk Officer at Herts CC) about ditch dredging. As new housing developments' flood mitigation plans rely solely on local ditches, she asked how the developers intended to get the landowners to dredge of maintain them? Since the Environment Agency stopped dredging, it just doesn't get done. Cllr Fox thought this issue should be resolved at Dacorum borough or Herts County Council level. Cllr Smith-Wright suggested also writing to our MP, Victoria Collins, and said she would be following this up.

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
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# If you go down to the woods today
